

Floor Venn Diagrams Suggestion Guide

Teaching Tip #1: I encourage you to allow your students to create their own rules, however I included some for each subject in case you need to start students off with example.

Teaching Tip #2: To add rigor, choose more subjective rules or rules that include the center “overlap” section (ex. *Positive Connotation, Negative Connotation, Could be both depending on how it’s used*). To lower the rigor, eliminate the overlap and have students sort into two categories.
